PROGRAM NOTES FLUTE CHOIR SELECTIONS

The Sleigh Ride was composed in 1755 by Leopold Mozart, the father and principal teacher of the very well-known Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. It was originally a movement of his *Divertimento in F* for orchestra and has now been arranged for flute choir with optional percussion. *The Sleigh Ride* was one of the last pieces that Leopold wrote before dedicating his life to advancing his son's musical career.

On a Quiet Christmas Night is a simple arrangement of *Silent Night* combined with a melody that Lisa Ochoco herself composed. The melody from *Silent Night* and the melody composed by Ochoco are played both independently from each other and simultaneously with each other. The other flute parts form the foundation for these beautifully interwoven melodies.

We Three Kings/Carol of the Bells is a unique arrangement which combines, in intriguing ways, the familiar Christmas songs We Three Kings and Carol of the Bells. The piece begins with a theme from Carol of the Bells which is then often used as a rhythmic ostinato element that ties the two songs together. The melodies from the two pieces are alternated as well as juxtaposed throughout the piece, being played by different instruments and thereby causing changes in the texture of the piece. It is a very joyous celebration of Christmas.

Joy to the World was not originally written to be a Christmas carol. It was a poem penned by the English minister and writer, Isaac Watts, whose words were inspired by Psalm 98 of the Bible. This poem was first published in 1719 in Watts' collection of hymns and spiritual songs entitled The Psalms of David. The melody most widely paired with this poem is "Antioch" which is often attributed to George Frideric Handel or Lowell Mason. The reality is that this melody had been around in England for several years before Mason published it in the United States of America in 1848, but Mason was the first to pair it with Watts' text. It is interesting to note that the first four notes of the hymn *Joy to the World* are the same as the first four notes of Handel's chorus Lift Up Your Heads, which is part of *Messiah*, and the third line of the hymn can be found in Handel's *Comfort Ye*, also part of *Messiah*. It is known that Mason was a great admirer and scholar of Handel's music so there has been much speculation as to how much influence *Messiah* had on *Joy to the World*.

SLEIGH RIDE DANCE

Sleigh Ride Dance composed by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756 - 1791) is the third in a set of three compositions written in the late 1700s, entitled *Three German Dances*. Prior to the entrance of the sleigh bells that emphasize the title of the dance, there is a series of repeating phrases that pass between the trumpets, woodwinds, and violins. The topography of the dynamics throughout the piece create the feeling of a sleigh ride, as they rise and fall like a sleigh would over snow. These phrases are followed by a post horn solo that provides a clear and peaceful atmosphere to the piece. *Sleigh Ride* was composed in 1791, the last year of Mozart's life, which is said to be one of Mozart's most productive years.

Claude Debussy (1862 - 1918) is believed to have written *Rêverie* between 1880 and 1884 when he was a student at the *Conservatoire de Paris*, but was greatly displeased when his publisher Eugene Fromont published it in 1890. In an angry letter to Fromont he wrote, "I regret very much your decision to publish Rêverie. I wrote it in a hurry years ago, purely for material considerations. It is a work of no consequence, and I frankly consider it to be no good!" In spite of Debussy's opinions of his early work, it went on to become both a critical and commercial success and is credited with slightly influencing jazz harmonies decades later.

THE SKATER'S WALTZ

The Skater'z Waltz, or *Les Patineurs*, was composed by Émile Waldteufel (1837 - 1915) in 1882. The piece is inspired by a skating rink (*cercie des patineurs*) at the Bois de Boulogne in Paris, France. The introduction to the waltz calls to mind the poise of a skater, and the rapid runs paint a picture of a wintry atmosphere. The piece is Waldteufel's most recognized, and has been used in countless movies, television shows, and video games.





MARCH OF THE TOYS FROM BABES IN TOYLAND

March of the Toys comes from the second act of Victor Herbert's (1859 - 1924) operetta *Babes in Toyland*. It wove together various characters from Mother Goose nursey rhymes into a musical extravaganza that opened in New York in 1903. It ran for 192 performances and inspired many other "fairytale shows" over the next decade.

DREAM PANTOMIME FROM HANSEL AND GRETEL

Engelbert Humperdinck (1854 - 1921) is best known for his composition of the opera *Hansel and Gretel*, which he published in 1893. He first composed four songs to accompany a puppet show being put on by his nieces at home, and later composed a complete orchestration in 1891, with the opera premiering in December 1893. *Hansel and Gretel* was the Royal Opera House of London's first complete opera broadcast over the radio in 1923, and eight years later, it was the first opera transmitted live from the Metropolitan Opera in New York.



DANCE OF THE SUGAR PLUM FAIRY & TREPAK

FROM THE NUTCRACKER

The Nutcracker, composed by Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (1840 - 1893), is a two-act classical ballet set on Christmas Eve at the foot of a Christmas tree in a child's imagination. *Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy*, from the second act of *The Nutcracker*, is meant to sound like "drops of water shooting from a fountain," at the request of the ballet's choreographer. This led Tchaikovsky to utilize the newly-invented celesta, which he kept relatively secret, not wanting other Russian composers to beat him to using the new instrument.

Trepak is one of the several ethnic dances based on the traditional Ukrainian folk dance of the same name. Most often, *Trepak* is considered as the 'Russian dance' and is arguably the most popular dance of the ballet. *Trepak* can be heard widely in popular culture, such as in the Disney film *Fantasia* and in the video game *Tetris*.





WHITE CHRISTMAS

Though the music of Irving Berlin (1888 -1989) forms a large part of the Great American Songbook, his most famous composition is *White Christmas*, which was introduced in the 1942 film *Holiday Inn*, where it was sung by Bing Crosby. *White Christmas* is the mostrecorded Christmas song in history, with over 500 recorded versions of the song existing across several different languages. Some of the most notable covers of the song include recordings by Frank Sinatra, Elvis Presley, The Supremes, Lady Gaga, Bette Midler, and Michael Bublé.





SLEIGH RIDE

Leroy Anderson (1908 - 1975) composed one of his most famous works, *Sleigh Ride*, in 1946. Contrary to what one might think, Anderson wrote this festive holiday tune during a July heat wave! The original composition contained no lyrics, but the well-known tales of wintertime activities were added in 1950 by Mitchell Parish. The orchestral version of *Sleigh Ride* was first recorded in 1949 by Arthur Fiedler and the Boston Pops Orchestra. It was a hit record on RCA Victor Red Seal, and has become one of the orchestra's signature songs. The 45 rpm version was originally issued on red vinyl.

MUSIC DIRECTOR: William Esterling III

Will Esterling, a native of Wilmington, Delaware, is a passionate and dedicated music director, educator, and trombonist who has spent his life immersed in the world of music. His journey from a supportive musical upbringing to becoming the Music Director of the COSMIC Symphony is a testament to his unwavering commitment to the art of music.

Born and raised in Wilmington, Delaware, Will Esterling was fortunate to grow up in a household that encouraged and celebrated music. His journey as a musician began in the fourth grade when he picked up the trombone. This early connection to music sparked a lifelong passion that would define his career.

Will's educational journey led him to pursue music at a higher level. He earned a Bachelor's degree in Music from Ithaca College, where he majored in Music Education and Trombone Performance.



His dedication to his craft didn't stop there, as he continued his studies and achieved a Master's degree in Conducting from the Catholic University of America.

Throughout his career, Will Esterling has held several key roles in the world of music. He served as the assistant conductor to the New Orchestra of Washington (NOW), contributing to the orchestra's artistic vision and musical excellence. Additionally, he brought his talents and expertise to the Maryland Classic Youth Orchestra (MCYO) as their assistant conductor.

As the Pep Band Director at American University, Will's leadership and musical direction added an electrifying dimension to campus life. He also assumed the role of Coordinator for the Winds Department at the Levine Community Music School, where he guided and inspired young musicians to reach their full potential.

Currently, Will serves as a trombonist with the 287th Army Band of the Delaware National Guard, where he continues to share his musical talents and dedication to service. His educational journey brought him to Tyler Elementary in SE Washington, DC, where he teaches music, shaping the next generation of musicians.

Will Esterling's life is defined by his mission to serve people through music, both as an educator and performer. His commitment to music education and his passion for performing have touched the lives of many, making him a respected figure in the musical community.



Will's journey has been enriched by the guidance of notable mentors, including Marin Alsop, Murry Sidlin, James Ross, and Simeone Tartaglione. These influential figures have helped shape his understanding of music and conducting.

An advocate for modern music and progressive programming, Will Esterling is dedicated to expanding the horizons of musical exploration and ensuring that the art form continues to evolve.

Will Esterling's journey from a supportive

home in Delaware to the role of Music Director of the COSMIC Symphony is a testament to his unwavering dedication, musical prowess, and passion for educating and inspiring others through music. His life's work is a harmonious fusion of artistic expression and community service, making him a dynamic force in the world of music.

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
