FLUTE CHOIR SELECTIONS

Scarborough Fair is a traditional English folksong dating back to the Middle Ages and referring to an old fair in Scarborough, North Yorkshire. It was often sung to various melodies but usually contained refrains resembling "parsley, sage, rosemary and thyme" and "Then she'll be a true love of mine". It is traditionally a love song that requests the lover to perform certain impossible tasks, which have changed over the years. The melody that is used in this version of Scarborough Fair was made famous by Paul Simon and Art Garfunkel in the 1960s.

I'll Love My Love is a Cornish folksong that tells the story of a young woman whose lover was sent off to sea by his parents in an attempt to ruin their relationship. He eventually returns and they live happily ever after. Each stanza ends with the refrain "I love my love because I know my love loves me!" This arrangement of the song is inspired by the settings that Gustav Holst wrote for his Second Suite in F for Military Band and for his four-part SATB vocal version of I'll Love My Love.

For Love of Swans was commissioned by the National Flute Association to honor the memory of Phil Swanson who holds a place in many peoples' hearts as teacher, mentor, and friend. It premiered in 2019. This piece embodies his sense of humor, his generous spirit, his love of Celtic music and of low flutes, his support of those needing a boost, and his giving of praise and encouragement to all around him. Catherine McMichael calls it "Greensleeves, for Phil."

DI CAPUA

Eduardo Di Capua (12 March 1865 – 3 October 1917) was an Italian composer of Neapolitan ballads. He earned his living by playing in small theaters and cafes in and around Naples, and later also gave piano lessons. His most famous work was *O sole mio* (1898); its popularity was immense, and never abated. Other celebrated songs were *Maria Mari* (1899), *Torna maggio* (1900); and *Canzona bella*. Di Capua sold these songs to publishers outright, and so did not benefit by their popularity. He unfortunately died in extreme poverty.



O sole mio is a well-known Neapolitan song written in 1898. Its Neapolitan language lyrics were written by Giovanni Capurro, and the music was composed by Eduardo Di Capua and Alfredo Mazzucchi (1878–1972). The title translates literally as "my sun" or "my sunshine." The lyrics have been translated to other languages.

BIZET

Georges Bizet (né Alexandre César Léopold Bizet; 25 October 1838 – 3 June 1875) was a French composer of the Romantic era. Best known for his operas in a career cut short by his early death, Bizet achieved few successes before his final work, *Carmen*, which has become one of the most popular and frequently performed works in the entire opera repertoire.

During a brilliant student career at the Conservatoire de Paris, Bizet won many prizes, including the prestigious *Prix de Rome* in 1857. His keyboard and orchestral compositions were largely ignored; as a result, his career stalled, and he earned his living mainly by arranging and transcribing the music of others. Restless for success, he began many theatrical projects during the 1860s, most of which were abandoned.



The production of his final opera, *Carmen*, was delayed because of fears that its themes of betrayal and murder would offend audiences. After its premiere on 3 March 1875, Bizet was convinced that the work was a failure; he died of a heart attack three months later, unaware that it would prove a spectacular and enduring success.

When rehearsals began in October 1874, however, the orchestra had difficulties with the score, finding some parts unplayable. The chorus likewise declared some of their music impossible to sing and were dismayed that they had to act as individuals, smoking and fighting onstage rather than merely standing in line.

The opera's first performance extended to four-and-a-half hours; the final act did not begin until after midnight. Much of the press comment was negative, expressing consternation that the heroine was an amoral seductress rather than a woman of virtue. There was, however, praise from the poet Théodore de Banville, who applauded Bizet for presenting a drama with real men and women instead of the usual *Opéra-Comique* "puppets." The public's reaction was lukewarm, and Bizet soon became convinced of its failure; "I foresee a definite and hopeless flop."

PUCCINI

Giacomo Puccini (22 December 1858 – 29 November 1924) was an Italian composer known primarily for his operas. Regarded as the greatest and most successful proponent of Italian opera after Verdi, he was descended from a long line of composers, stemming from the late-Baroque era. Though his early work was firmly rooted in traditional late-19th-century Romantic Italian opera, he later developed his work in the realistic verismo style, of which he became one of the leading exponents.

Turandot, Puccini's final opera, was left unfinished at the composer's death in November 1924, and the last two scenes were completed by Franco Alfano based on the composer's sketches. The libretto for Turandot was based on a play of the same name by Carlo Gozzi.



The music of the opera is heavily inflected with pentatonic motifs, intended to produce an Asiatic flavor to the music. *Turandot* contains a number of memorable stand-alone arias, among them *Nessun Dorma*.



BERNSTEIN

Leonard Bernstein (August 25, 1918 – October 14, 1990) was an American conductor, composer, pianist, music educator, author, and humanitarian. Considered to be one of the most important conductors of his time, he was the first American conductor to receive international acclaim. Bernstein was the recipient of many honors, including seven Emmy Awards, two Tony Awards, sixteen Grammy Awards including the Lifetime Achievement Award, and the Kennedy Center Honor.



As a composer he wrote in many genres, including symphonic and orchestral music, ballet, film and theatre music, choral works, opera, chamber music and works for the piano. His best-known work is the Broadway musical *West Side Story*, which continues to be regularly performed worldwide, and has been adapted into two (1961 and 2021) feature films.


Bernstein was the first American-born conductor to lead a major American symphony orchestra. Through dozens of national and international broadcasts, including Young People's Concerts with the New York Philharmonic, he sought to make music both intelligible and enjoyable to all. Through his educational efforts, including several books and the creation of two major international music festivals, he influenced several generations of young musicians.

Bernstein collaborated with director and choreographer Jerome Robbins, book writer Arthur Laurents, and lyricist Stephen Sondheim to make *West Side Story*. The story is an updated retelling of Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet*, set in the mid-1950s in the slums of New York City's Upper West Side. The original Broadway production opened at the Winter Garden Theatre on September 26, 1957, and ran 732 performances.

Bernstein's score for *West Side Story* blends "jazz, Latin rhythms, symphonic sweep and musical-comedy conventions in groundbreaking ways for Broadway." In 1960, Bernstein prepared a suite of orchestral music from the show, titled Symphonic Dances from West Side Story, which continues to be popular with orchestras worldwide.

MUSIC DIRECTOR: William Esterling III

William Esterling III is excited to take on the position of Music Director at the COSMIC Symphony. Will is an advocate for music as both a performer and educator. As a conductor, Will serves as the assistant conductor at the New Orchestra of Washington (NOW) and the Maryland Classic Youth Orchestras (MCYO). As an educator, Will is an adjunct professor at



American University and serves as the Wind & Brass Department Chair at Levine Music. As a trombonist, Will serves as a musician in the 287th Army Band of the Delaware National Guard.

David W. Cook, is an International Award-winning American Tenor, Recitalist, & Philosopher whose work has been described as singing with "artistic vision, commitment, and a superb stage presence." with the published poetries by retired bishop, The Right Reverend, Dr. Graham Kings, inspired by the paintings of renowned painter, Silvia Dimitrova.
